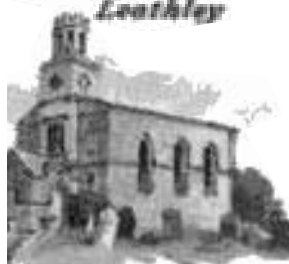

## LIFE ATTITUDES

'Life attitudes' is the title of this year's Lent course, to which everyone – whether they go to church or not – is most welcome. Attitude is a word which has come to have negative connotations. We can talk of someone having an 'attitude problem' as if attitude is something that happens to other people. In fact of course we all have an attitude to lots of different things, some small and insignificant, others more important. Perhaps most important of all is our general attitude to life.

The famous sayings of Jesus which are recorded in the fifth chapter of Matthew's gospel have come to be known as the Beatitudes:

“ Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted.

Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth.

Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.

Blessed are the merciful, for they will receive mercy.

Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God.

Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God.

Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. ”

These words are all about attitude, and we will be looking at them on each Monday evening in March at 7.30 pm at Norwood Chapel. The sessions are entitled Living Well, Living Openly, Living Purposefully and Living Lovingly. Surely these are what we all wish to do – so why not come along and join in the discussion about how (indeed if) Jesus' attitude is relevant to 21<sup>st</sup> century living?

There are far more folk thinking about spiritual things than ever let on. Surveys conducted in recent years indicate that around two-thirds of UK adults pray, leading the Church of England's Head of Research and Statistics, the Revd Lynda Barley, to describe prayer as “one of the best kept secrets in modern Britain”. If you are one of the silent majority who do pray at least some of the time, then you might just discover some like minded people to chew things over with. Do something different for Lent – come and discuss attitude.

## PALM SUNDAY - MARCH 28TH

Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday, when the Church remembers how Jesus arrived at the gates of Jerusalem just a few days before the Passover was due to be held. He was the Messiah come to his own people in their capital city, and yet he came in humility, riding on a young donkey, not in triumph, riding on a war-horse.

As Jesus entered the city, the crowds gave him a rapturous welcome, throwing palm fronds into his path. They knew his reputation as a healer, and welcomed him. But sadly the welcome was short-lived and shallow, for Jerusalem would soon reject her Messiah, and put him to death. On this day churches worldwide will distribute little crosses made from palm fronds in memory of Jesus' arrival in Jerusalem. *See P 6.*



### PAUL AUSTICK—FORMER BOOKSELLER, TIMBLE RESIDENT AND CHAPEL STEWARD

Paul Austick died in January after a lifetime of service to charity, the Methodist Church and bookselling.

Born in Leeds, the twin pillars of bookselling and Methodism were gained from his father who was a Methodist Local Preacher and Sunday School teacher.

Following the death of his father in 1938, Paul's mother ran the family bookselling business through the 2nd World War whilst Paul saw active service in India with the 10th Gurkha Rifles.

After the war Paul and his brother David joined their mother in Austicks bookshops. Austicks was a by-word for books in Leeds from this time until its closure, following David's death and Paul's illness in 1997, when there were 9 shops in Leeds and Harrogate.

Paul, Frances and the family moved to Timble in 1976 where they threw themselves into village life. They became members of the Timble Church Council in 1979 and Paul became Chapel Steward in 1985 following the death of Mark Bradley, a position he held until 1997. During this time Paul and Frances ensured that the both the fabric and the society of Timble Chapel were maintained, being generous in every sense. It is due, in large measure, to their efforts that the chapel in Timble remains a place of worship in the village.

Paul was also a Trustee of the Robinson Library and again he and Frances played a major part in both helping to maintain the building and organise events.

For nearly 40 years Paul was chairman of the Leeds Committee for Unicef UK and sat on the Unicef UK board for a number of years. His experiences of life in India and his love of children made him passionate about helping those unable to help themselves. His natural enthusiasm inspired others to follow him making the Leeds Group still one of the best fundraising groups in the country.

Paul was a key player in the setting up of the Puffin Children's Book Club and also the Yorkshire Post Literary Luncheons. He will be remembered by all who knew him for his sunny smile. This facet of his nature was mentioned by all those who spoke at a most fitting thanksgiving service, held at Otley Methodist Church, for a life well lived.

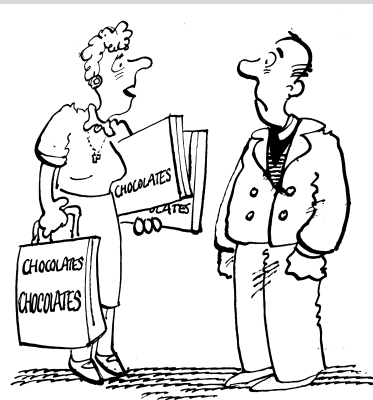

## WE'RE READY TO MERGE

The Methodist Church's President of Conference has declared to the Church of England that the British Methodist Church was "prepared to go out of existence ... for the sake of mission." This was "not a death wish", the church has emphasised.

Mr Gamble's candid words were uttered at the Church of England's General Synod last month. The President's suggestion that British Methodism was ready to "be changed or even to cease having a separate existence as a Church" prompted speculation in the national media that the Methodist Church was about to be 'absorbed' into the Church of England.

Following the wave of media reaction, a spokesperson from the Connexional Team issued a statement denying that the Methodist Church, with its 256,000 members, would be "swallowed up" by its Covenant partner, which has 1.7 million regular worshippers.

The Church has now sought to add further clarification to the President's proclamation.

Assistant Secretary of the Conference the Rev Ken Howcroft told the **Methodist Recorder**: "Methodism began as a discipleship movement within the wider Church; a society of people seeking holiness and engaging in mission, though gradually becoming a Church. We cherish our traditions and history; we cherish our institutions and structures. But we still have the DNA of a movement and recognise that if our institutions and structures get in the way of mission and the Kingdom, the demands of mission and the Kingdom must take precedence."

That may sound primitive to us, accustomed as we are to nice facilities in the home - though it wasn't always so - but what an improvement to health and well-being those blocks have brought to the people of Kiambiu!

To achieve this improvement, local people have had vital help from Christian Aid partner MNU, funded by people like us. So, thank you!

There's lots more to do, of course, and Christian Aid Week is coming round again in May.

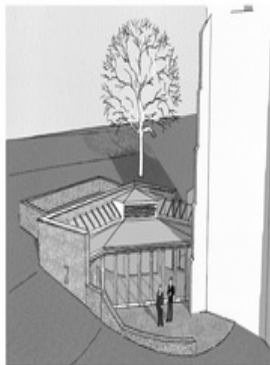

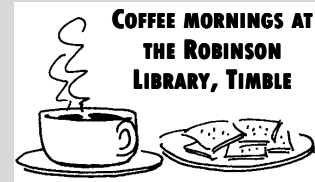

## LOCAL EFFORT TO HELP AIDS ORPHANS—CAN YOU KNIT?

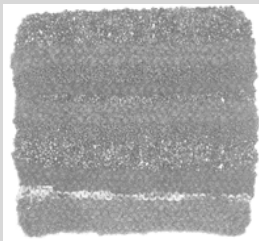
Local residents Hazel Pullan of Weston and Sherry James have set themselves a target of knitting 200 squares to make blankets for Aids orphans in Africa.

Hazel writes: "It is estimated that there are 11.6 million orphans in sub-saharan Africa. 1.4 million live in South Africa. Many live in great poverty in shack settlements. Some head up families of their siblings and other children and some live alone, without shelter, in hills and dumps around the cities.

"They need love, shelter, food, education and warmth. Many children's charities are working hard to provide the first four. Charity knitting and crocheting can provide the last.

"This simple charity crochet and knitting project, to make and send 8"/20cm squares, takes little time, costs little and does make a difference. All while you do what you love - knitting and crocheting.

"There are thousands of people making and sending squares around



the world, but the need is so great, we implore you to join our army of charity knitters and crocheters as well.

"Every square that is sent will be used in a blanket to keep an orphan or abandoned child warm. The Soweto Comfort Club collect, sort, bundle and join the squares into blankets and then distribute them to groups of children, greatly in need."

## Washburn Valley Heritage Project

A 'Memories Day' took place at the Robinson Library, Timble in February. The purpose of the day was threefold: to launch the oral history project for the Washburn Valley, to encourage residents and those people with a strong connection with the valley to take part in the project and to start recording memories from those present.

Over 30 people attended the event and were treated to a slide show of old photos of the valley and its inhabitants from David Alred. The photos sparked many memories and reminiscences in the discussion that followed. We heard about gazunders, thunderboxes, ploughing with horses, fiddle drills, drinking in public houses which no longer exist, cold winters and even colder houses, the valley at war and of much loved family members and neighbours who are no longer with us.

Everyone voted the event a success. Although many did not know what to expect beforehand they told us how much they had enjoyed talking to each other of their shared memories of times past. The event itself, and the fine lunch that followed, gave neighbours a rare opportunity to re-unite. One of our guests declared he hadn't sat down with an old school friend for twenty years!

Memories Day also saw the beginning of our association with the Leeds Trinity University College on the Washburn Valley Project. Students and a key member of staff were on hand to film the event and some interviews. Filming also took place at the site of the proposed Washburn Heritage Centre before work begins and in and around the valley. The film will be used on our website.

Oral history is the recording of people's memories and feelings and preserving their views for posterity. As one of those taking part said, "I really enjoyed today, talking with old friends about happy times. I would be glad to get involved in the project because I believe it is important to tell our children and their children about our lives so that there will be memories left behind when we have gone."

The plans for the Washburn Heritage Centre have spurred us into action. We intend to use the recordings we make in publications, exhibitions and on the community website. We will retain the recordings in an archive and these can be used for research purposes and importantly the memories of this generation will be preserved for future generations.

The project will take place over the next few months and we are keen to hear from anyone who is interested in sharing their memories with us. Please contact the organisers for further details:

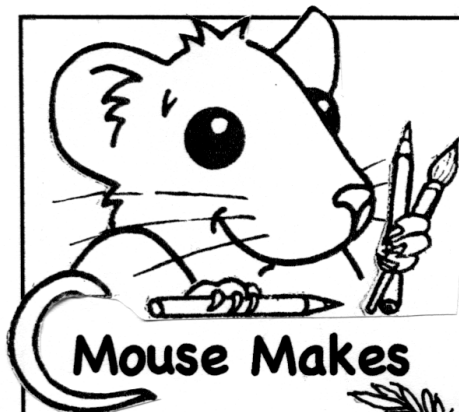


## THE VAVASOUR SOCIETY

1. From a sheet of paper cut 2 strips about 15mm wide.



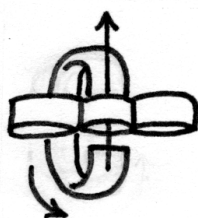
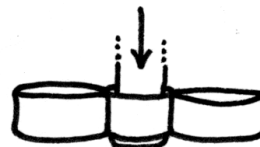
2. Take one strip. > Fold up about 17mm (a little wider than the paper strip) then fold over **twice** more



3. Fold the other end around and behind. Then push down and fold flat. This makes the

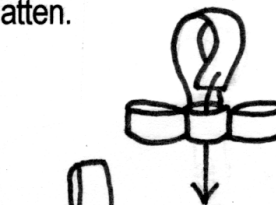
< **cross-beam**

4. Put a blob of glue on one end of the > other strip of paper then **push** through the middle folds in the cross-beam



5. **Bend** the other end around and **behind** the cross-beam and **back** through the middle folds. Gently pull all the way through then flatten.

6. **Bend** the end again through the centre folds and **pull** through until you have a loop the same size as the loops on the cross-beam then flatten to make a cross.

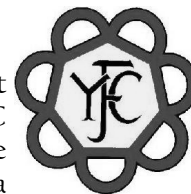

Rev Howcroft pointed out that Methodists have “voted constantly over the years for unity schemes that are designed to increase the whole Church’s effectiveness in mission.” Affirming Mr Gamble’s works, he added: “This is not a death wish, but a desire to be obedient and a willingness to be transformed. We can countenance ceasing to exist as a separate Church because we know that we will still be the Methodist people within a wider Church.”
