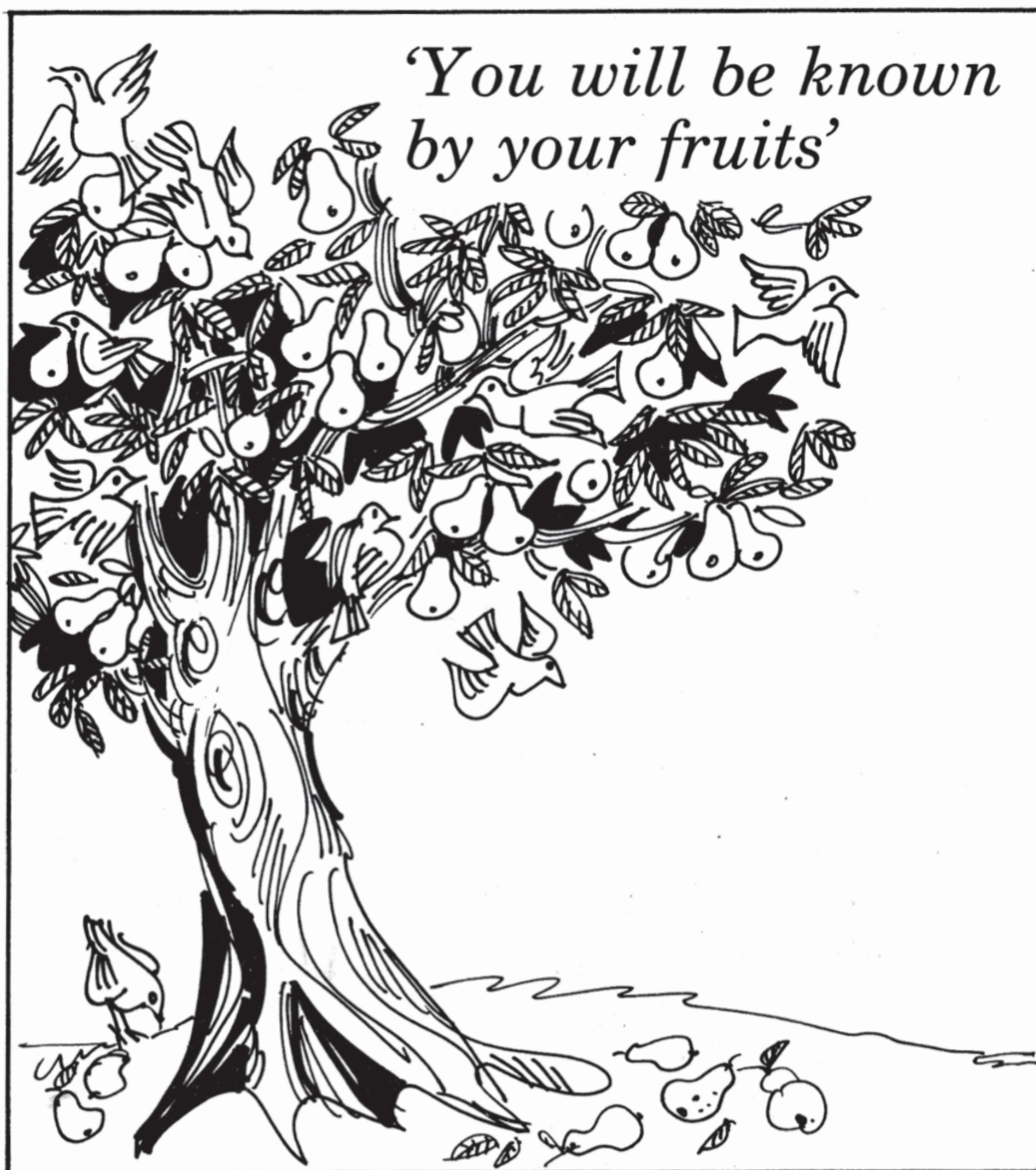

## REFLECTIONS FOR OCT 2011

Many of you will know that I have recently returned from a three month Sabbatical. This is a time when Ministers get the chance to read and reflect without all of the practical, day to day, tasks and distractions that come with being a Minister.

Part of the studying that I have been doing was focussed upon the Sermon on the Mount and how it reveals to us the narratives or stories that Jesus lived by. I have been reading a book by James Bryan Smith (who is Professor of Theology at the Friends University in Kansas and a Minister in the United Methodist Church of America) titled, *'The Good and Beautiful Life.'* Smith argues that the task of all followers of Jesus is not to try and live the sort of life we think will please Jesus but to allow him to grow within us so that we begin to think the things he thinks and do the things he does.

I was particularly struck by his understanding of the Beatitudes (*Blessed are the poor in spirit etc*). He argues that usually we understand the Beatitudes as being about trying to develop in our lives the kind of characteristics that Jesus says are blessed. But who wants to be poor in spirit and who wants to mourn or be persecuted. Those are not things we should seek.

Rather Smith suggests that Jesus was talking directly to those who were described by the characteristics of the Beatitudes. The context is that Jesus had been speaking and ministering to those that were usually cast to one side – the poor, the disabled, the servants, the women – by the religious structures and systems of their day. And he was saying to them, *"No longer will you be excluded because of your low position. From now on you will be included. You too will be blessed by God. You too can know me. You are invited into the Kingdom."*

Based on this understanding, being a Christian ceases to be about trying to live a good life and do the right things. Now it becomes simply about knowing Jesus and allowing him to develop a vibrant relationship with him.

Perhaps you might consider re-reading the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew Chs 5 – 7) from this perspective and allow Jesus' narratives to challenge the ones you hold about how to please God.

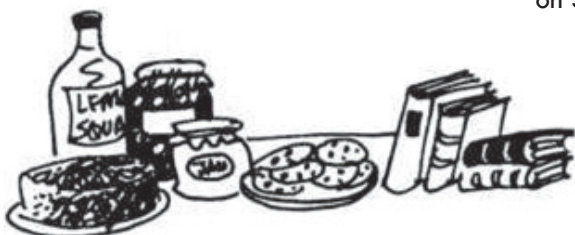

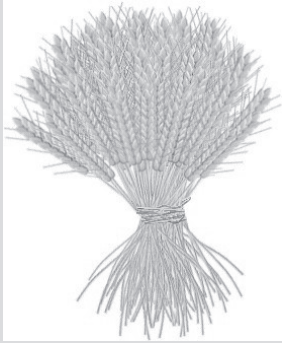

## A SAFE DAY OUT - AN INTRODUCTION TO EMERGENCY FIRST AID

On Thursday August 25th there was a meeting of a small group of ladies and one gentleman. The aim of the day was to inform, or refresh, or amplify our experiences with First Aid Training. The leader was John Wilkinson from Huddersfield and the momentum was intense and hands-on. When you have a speaker who knows his subject and who gives you the assurance to initiate emergency first aid for the victim prior to the arrival of paramedics, you do feel encouraged and a little more reassured.

We were taught the resuscitation procedure and the 'recovery position' and that your quick assessments are strategic to the patient's recovery, and this was where the 'hands on' bit came in. We were sufficiently absorbed not to notice how the time passed, and were surprised when refreshment time came round.



After an ample lunch, the session took on a more inter-active format. Now we were advised what to look for with certain illnesses. Epilepsy, diabetes, strokes and some other conditions were discussed frankly, helpfully and authoritatively but sadly time ran out because John had over-run his time by one and a half hours.

Importantly, there was a discussion about having a defibrillator available for local use, with a rota of willing personnel. Emergencies do occur. There was a lot to think about. I understand that there is the possibility of another of these days being held and I would urge you to take the opportunity and attend. We thoroughly enjoyed the whole day with its fellowship in Norwood Chapel. Thanks are particularly due to John Wilkinson and the event organiser Jeanette Wight, and to Diane Coleman for the use of the Retreat Centre. Jeanette can be contacted on 01943 464010.

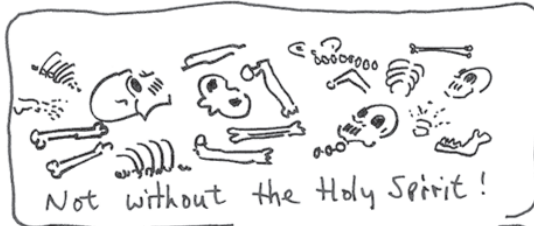

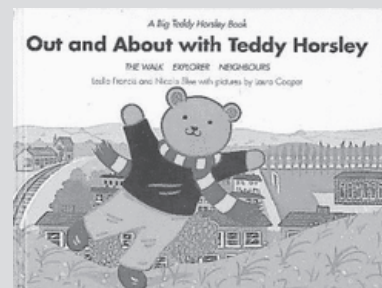

**A**t the meeting on 25th August nine Parish Councillors were in attendance along with Councillor J Fort representing NYCC. Chairman Heather Stewart welcomed new Councillor Alison White who is representing Denton.

The Clerk gave a report on action taken between meetings. Discussions took place regarding the Wheelwright Stones and finger sign post located in the middle of the stones in Askwith. Some of these items are located on private land and the Clerk is to seek further clarification from NYCC regarding remaining ownership of the land.

Standing Orders, Financial Regulations and Code of Practice for Handling Complaints are all in the process of being updated with copies forwarded to Councillors in preparation for adaptation at the November meeting. Condition of notice boards was discussed with the notice board at Langbar being recorded as suffering in the weather due to its exposed position. The Clerk is to investigate if commuted sums can be used for a replacement. Highway matters including the condition of the roads and pot holes were discussed. Councillor Fort reported that whilst the Highways department had budget constraints safety issues were still paramount. It should be noted that dangerous pot holes can be reported to your local councillor, to the Clerk or direct to NYCC on 0845 8727274.

NYCC Home Library & Information Service (HLIS), which is a free home delivery service for ill or disabled residents is now up and running. Details are shown below and on Parish noticeboards. The accounts were approved and payments authorised.

The next meeting is on 17th November at Askwith Village Hall.

We offer free access to books, audio books, music on CD, DVDs, large print books, children's books and information. We have teams of local volunteers who deliver the books once a fortnight. You'll get to know your regular volunteers and many readers enjoy a chat as well.

Alternatively, you can arrange for your own volunteer (perhaps a relative or neighbour) to collect your books from the library. We can choose books for you to suit your tastes, just like the home delivery service and keep them ready for collection.

Six Parish Councillors attended the September meeting of Washburn Parish Council. Holidays and work commitments prevented a full attendance.

## WASHBURN PARISH COUNCIL

Maintenance played a dominant role in discussions. Cllr Stephen Ryder reported that the Fewston Councillors had assessed the condition of Meagill Lane Chapel and received a quotation for the necessary works. The Council agreed for money to be spent on the roof, new guttering, coping stones and woodworm treatment. The four notice boards throughout the Parish would also be receiving new coats of varnish.

Because the NYCC Highways Department does not have funds to cut back all the verges, the Council resolved to instigate its own programme of maintenance, focussing initially on Hardisty Hill, Blubberhouses and North Lane, Timble.

It was noted that, following a meeting of the NYCC Planning and Regulatory Functions Sub-Committee Meeting on the 5<sup>th</sup> August, the Order to confirm Billy Lane, Timble, as a Restricted Byway, would be sent to the Secretary of State for consideration. Several Highways issues would be pursued by the Clerk, who was also asked to establish that salt drops would take place again this winter.

Cllr Elaine Stead had attended a training session on Commuted Sums, presented by the Systems and Information Officer of Harrogate Borough Council. The Council is now in receipt of maps identifying allocation areas.

The Energy Saving Trust is keen to offer people over 70 'free and impartial advice' regarding free loft and cavity wall insulation and would welcome calls on 01904 554406.

The Parish Council are concerned that there are parts of the highway in our area that need urgent repairs. A representative from the parish will meet with Mr Goff Cobb, NYCC Highways, to identify the work needed. As NYCC has limited resources only the most urgent work will be done.

## LOWER WASHBURN PARISH COUNCIL

Planning permission has been given by Harrogate Council for the erection of a replacement single storey side extension to the Leathley village hall.

The Parish Council continues to be concerned that the triangle of land near Leathley village hall is being eroded by vehicles driving over the edge of the grass and using it as a parking area. One possible solution that is being considered is to install some kerbing.

A planning application has been submitted concerning the Allerton Waste Recovery Park which would be a new waste treatment facility for north Yorkshire. This would be based at an existing quarry, sited next to a landfill site near the A1 motorway at Knaresborough. This facility if approved would reduce the amount of North Yorkshire's household waste going to landfill by at least 90%.
